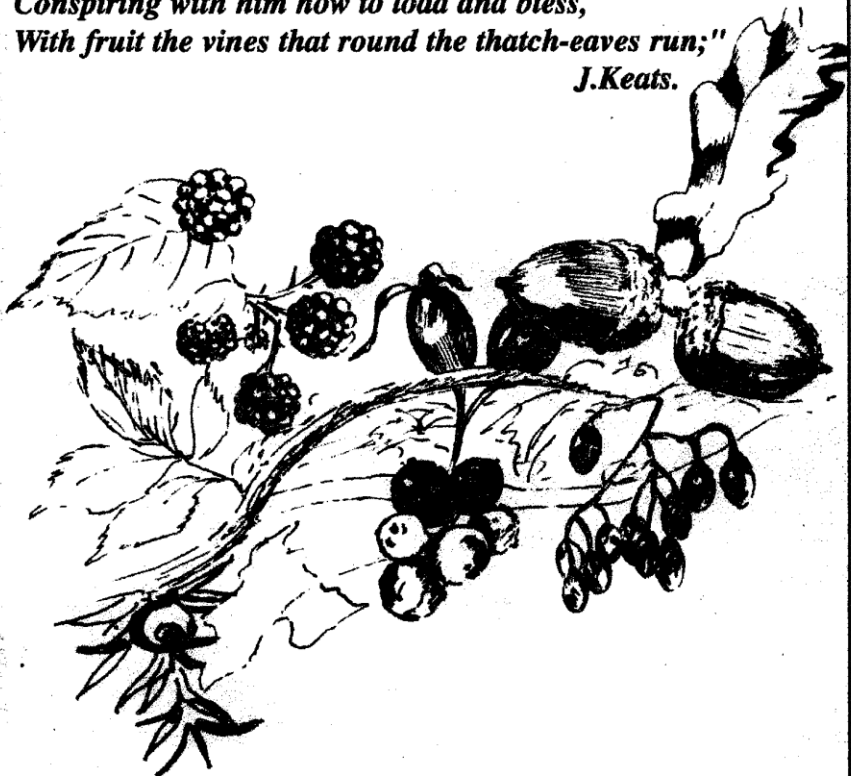

CHANGE

I have just spent a lovely week in Dorset. It was great to spend time walking by the seashore, listening to the waves crash on the beach and exploring the natural beauty all around (my dog has also enjoyed all the different walks and has proved once more that 4 legs are better than 2 when it comes to hills). It reminded me how lucky we are to live in such a beautiful country with such varied landscapes.

I also noticed the beginning of the change of season: the dew fell and the trees changed colour. As Keats put it in his 'Ode to Autumn', this is the 'season of mists and mellow fruitfulness'. Wildlife is also preparing for the winter ahead: squirrels are 'squirreling away' as much as they can before winter sets in, swallows are preparing for their long flight to Africa. As they go we are looking forward to welcoming back the starlings as they arrive every evening to roost in the nearby marshes. There is a wonderful natural rhythm constantly going on around us.

For many of us this change in season can be particularly hard as it marks the oncoming winter when many people dread the long dark nights and the cold short days. For others it is a time to look forward to, as we prepare to make our houses cosy for winter by stockpiling enough logs and preparing to light our fires.

We also have a rhythm to our Church year. After the thanksgiving at harvest we enter a time of remembrance before Advent and Christmas. This year I am marking a celebration: it is a year since I moved here. The year has flown and it seems only yesterday I was sitting, surrounded by boxes wondering where to put everything; however it also seems a long time since I looked out at a sea of unfamiliar faces. It has been lovely getting to know many of you over the last year, and I look forward to continuing to get to know you better in the future.

Although it can be hard, and many people are not happy with the idea, change can be good, the change of season allows nature to rest over the winter. We sometimes get too comfortable in our lives and some change is necessary to take us out of our comfort zones. The Church of England is rather like one of those huge tankers that take many miles and hours to turn around; it changes slowly. It may be slow but change does happen. This month we welcome Bishop Ruth to our Diocese as the new Bishop of Taunton – we all wish her well.

There are many things that do stay the same but we should also consider what changes, if any, we do need to make. Maybe that is something each of us should do over this autumn: look back and look forward and consider whether we need to make any changes in our lives.

NEWS FROM CROSCOMBE PARISH COUNCIL

Community Plan – We have been identified as a flood risk area with 50 households identified. They will be notified soon and asked about any concerns and help they may need.

We are in the process of negotiating the siting of, and funding for, at least one if not two defibrillators for the village. Once they are acquired then every villager will be informed on how to access and use them.

Parking – despite a number of requests for residents to park in order to allow emergency vehicle access there is still a problem. We will now liaise with the police and the relevant authorities to try and ‘free up’ sections of the village so that no one will lose their life or home because a rescue vehicle cannot pass owing to inconsiderate parking.

Weeds etc - Please let us know where there is any severe vegetation growth so that we can ask the authorities to remove it for safety reasons.

The Parish Council are asking for interest in setting up a **Community Speedwatch Group** within Pilton. If you feel this would be a good idea or would be interested in sparing a few hours per month please let the Parish Clerk know.

The Parish Council want to **monitor crimes** within the village. Should you be a victim or feel the need to report a crime you should phone the police on 101, which is a non-emergency number, report it and obtain a crime number. Calls to 101 (from landlines and mobile networks) cost 15p per call, no matter what time of day you call, or how long you are on the phone. Please then email the Clerk with these details and she will keep a log of crimes in the village. The Parish Council will then be able to monitor the crimes and pursue persistent offences with the police. Pilton **footpath maps** are now on the Pilton Parish Website.

Mindline is a free service for people in Somerset provided by ‘Mind’ in Taunton and West Somerset. It is an out-of-hours helpline that is here for people who are in distress, feel isolated, distressed or upset.

CROSCOMBE WI

Our September meeting was without Lyn, our Secretary and fount of knowledge, so the business end was less slick than usual. We discussed up-coming events and spoke of the long campaign to tackle the issue of 'Care not Custody' for people with mental health problems. We resolved to send letters to The Secretary of State for Health and The Chancellor of the Exchequer requiring their full support when The Treasury agrees a business case for the full national rollout of liaison and diversion services by 2017/18.

We gave a warm welcome to Jules from Cheddar-based Prickles Hedgehog Rescue. With photographs, she described the work of the charity. Inspired in 2007 by the adventurous hedgehog who, entering by the cat flap, made its way upstairs and feasted on digestive biscuits, and a distressed hedgehog trapped for days in a garage, Jules began to research the care of hedgehogs who came to human notice. She spoke of her first over-wintering hedgehog, too small to survive hibernation, which lived in the utility room and was released to the wild in the following spring. We learnt of the vital role of Langford Small Animal Practice and the dedicated volunteers without whom the Centre would not enjoy the success that it does.
